LPF Reading Exemplar

The Chinese New Year

Task Description

In this reading activity, students read a Chinese legend about a quarrel among twelve animals who all wanted the New Year to be named after them. Students then responded to the related questions.

Preparation

Before the reading activity, the teacher drew students' attention to the zodiac of the Chinese New Year by asking them the Year they were born in. Students were then guided to read the book cover and predict the story by answering the following questions:

- How many animals can you find? Can you name all of them?
- Were the animals happy with one another?
- Can you guess what they were talking about?




	Questions	When students respond to the questions appropriately, they can:
1.	What did the princess ask the animals to do to stop the quarrel? <u>She asked them to have a swimming race</u> <u>across the wide river. 4.	 Who was the slowest in the race? How do you know? <i>The pig. 5.	Do you think the ox was happy with the result of the race? Why? <u>No, because the rat cheated in the race.</u> (Accept any reasonable answers.)	ATM 4 infer the feeling of characters from pieces of information in the story, e.g. 'But he didn't see the sly rat', ' the rat ran up the ox's head, and jumped onto the grass.'


