highlight the impact that social media posts can have on viewers and guide teachers to think about the use and management of their social media accounts. Trainers can then bring up the following case for teachers' in-depth discussion of the related questions.

## Case development and discussion

(30 minutes)

## 1. Case scenario [around 3 minutes]:

- Miss Chow, a teacher who enjoys sharing foodie posts on social media, gets upset about the advice given by Mr Chan, a citizen interviewed in the media, to young netizens. In response, she deliberately publishes a post, inciting her friends and students to boycott Mr Chan's cha chaan teng. Her post garners tremendous support from her network.

- The suggested duration of this part, including discussion and sharing, is around 27 minutes. Trainers may choose 2 or 3 questions from Annex 1 for discussion and allocate the time accordingly.
- Each group should have 5 to 6 participants, with a group leader to facilitate the discussion and collate the key points for subsequent sharing.

- Intended roles of social media
- Meaning of sharing posts on social media
- Nature of posts and target viewers
- Attitudes and motives in publishing posts
- ♦ Question 2: What are your thoughts on Miss Chow's post about Mr Chan?
  - Trainers may guide teachers to consider the following:
  - Intention in publishing the post
  - Appropriateness of the post content
  - Impact of this behaviour on viewers (including students)
  - Social expectations of teachers
- ♦ Question 3: What do you think if the post is not written but rather forwarded by Miss Chow?
  - Trainers may guide teachers to consider the following:
  - Intention in forwarding the post
  - Differences between writing a post personally and forwarding of posts
  - Impact of forwarding the content on viewers
  - Proper attitudes in managing personal social media accounts
- Trainers should lead the case discussion and guide teachers to explore ways to achieve mindfulness

School-based review (10 minutes)	School-based review extends from case level to school level. School management/trainers may conduct a prior review of the school codes/school-based policies in connection with teachers' words and deeds as well as their information literacy. They can supplement/revise the content, and elucidate the professional conduct expected of teachers during the training sessions.	To extend the review from case level to school level, and help teachers recognise the proper attitudes and the matters requiring attention in using social media.
